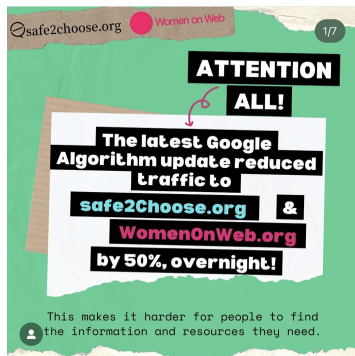


Examples of content suppression across Big Tech Platforms

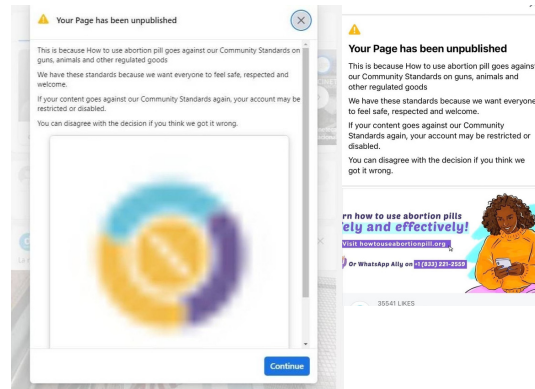
Amnesty International USA has been collecting examples of content suppression that we have received from reproductive health and rights partners.

Here are some examples from platforms where content is regularly suppressed:

Google: Women on Web and Safe2Choose lost about 50% of their website traffic following a Google Core update early in 2023.



Facebook: The "How To Use an Abortion Pill" account was suspended after sharing the following post.



Instagram: ShoutYourAbortion's Instagram account was suspended after sharing the following post:

Abortion Pills Can Now Be Offered at Retail Pharmacies, F.D.A. Says

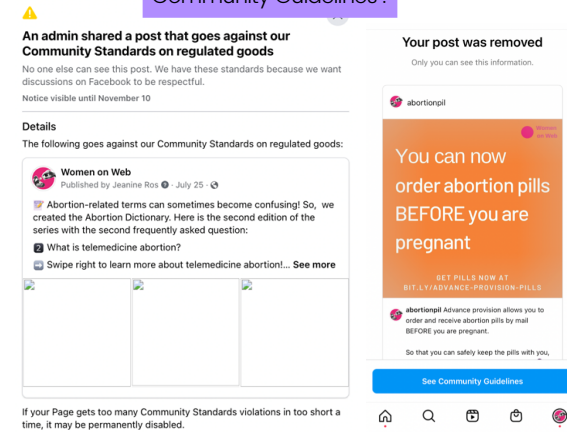
Mifepristone, the first of two drugs in medication abortions, previously had to be dispensed only by clinics, doctors or a few mail-order pharmacies. Now, if local drugstores or chains like CVS agree to certain rules, they can provide it.

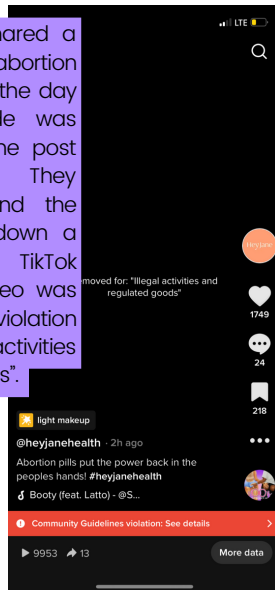

Facebook: The following posts was also taken down from Facebook for not following "Community Guidelines".

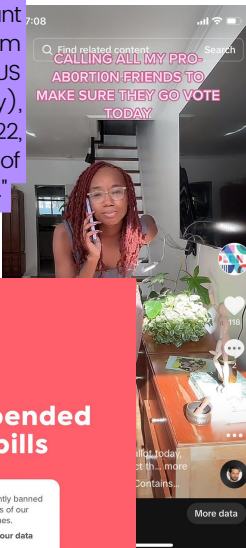
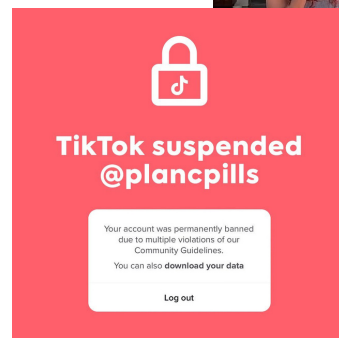


If your Page gets too many Community Standards violations in too short a time, it may be permanently disabled.

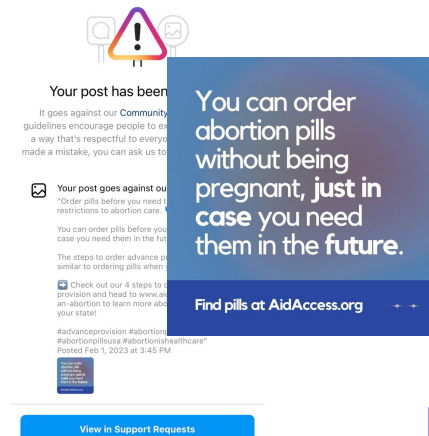
TikTok: HeyJane shared a video that showed abortion pills on June 25th (the day after Roe v Wade was overturned), and the post was removed. They reposted twice, and the video was taken down a total of 3 times. TikTok stated that the video was removed due to a violation related to "illegal activities and regulated goods".



TikTok: PLAN C's account was suspended from November 18 (US Midterm election day), to December 2nd, 2022, for "Multiple violations of Community Guidelines."



Instagram: The following Aid Access posts was removed for not following "Community Guidelines".



Instagram: The post below from a Planned Parenthood affiliate was flagged as "violent or graphic".
